

Transportation Planning



Transportation Planning provided contract-redistricting assistance to eight local governments following the release of the 2020 Census data. All WARC developed maps have been approved.



- The Tuscaloosa Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) is currently providing funds to 13 active transportation projects. Total MPO funds approved for those 13 projects are \$55,578,200.
- The West Alabama Rural Planning
 Organization (RPO) held 28 meetings
 of the Citizens Transportation Advisory
 Committees (CTAC), Technical
 Coordinating Committee (TCC)
 and the Policy Committee. Over 70
 transportation projects were reviewed
 and discussed.
- For the fourth year, the WARC
 Transportation Planning Department provided contract-GIS service for the City of Northport.
- The Tuscaloosa Area MPO and the West Alabama RPO adopted the West Alabama Coordinated Public Transit Plan 2022 Report. Also, the WARC Transportation Planning Department processed six transit grant applications. They consisted of five 5310 and one 5311 applications.
- The WARC Transportation Planning Department worked with Greene County to GPS and map their sewer system.
- The WARC Transportation Planning
 Department created and maintained
 new interactive web maps including
 regional transportation projects,
 regional traffic counts, safety
 observations, and a county features
 map hub. All interactive maps can be
 found on the WARC website.

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BETTER in Action through WARC

The Community and Economic Development Department completed the Bringing Economic Tools To Enrich and Revitalize (BETTER) program. BETTER has served as a catalyst for pandemic recovery and revitalization in the West Alabama region.

The Pandemic Recovery and Resiliency Plan was completed and posted on the WARC website.

BETTER sponsored seven elected officials and staff to the Alabama Association of Regional Council's Annual Training Conference held in Montgomery.

BETTER sponsored 14 local leaders to Your Town Alabama, an intensive workshop at Camp McDowel in Nauvoo, AL.

BETTER Action Plans for counties and municipalities were completed in June of 2022. Local leaders and partners are meeting to develop action plans to address priority projects in their communities.

Who We Are

The West Alabama Regional Commission (WARC) is one of the 12 regional councils in the State of Alabama. The councils serve local governments and citizens by coordinating region-wide projects and services, promoting cooperation among the local governments and carrying out state and federal programs on a regional basis. The West Alabama area is designated Planning District 2, or Region 2.

The WARC covers Bibb, Fayette, Greene, Hale, Lamar, Pickens and Tuscaloosa Counties. The commission is governed by an executive committee and a Board of Directors, made up of representatives from each of these seven counties and 35 municipalities, who annually elect a chairman and a vice-chairman. The Board is composed of citizens and policy-making elected officials from the member governments. It is with the Board's participation the WARC staff are enabled to carry out WARC's mission of improving the quality of life in West Alabama.



It is my privilege to continue my service as Executive Director of the West Alabama Regional Commission. WARC continues to grow. We are currently operating at our all-time highest staffing level with a total 68 employees. The board of directors has played a major role in bringing about this achievement. On behalf of the commission staff, I would like to thank this year's board for its hard work and dedication. To them, we are indebted for our success in providing services to the local governments and the citizens we serve in our region. As we look forward to the next year, our employees, with the board's leadership, will continue to be dedicated

to providing quality service to our member governments and the citizens of West Alabama.

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Area Agency on Aging (AAA)



During FY22, the AAA reached over 11,500 older adults and cargivers through various programs offered at the agency.

- The Aging & Disability Resource Center (ADRC) assisted more than 3,100 individuals. Assistance includes screening, follow-up and enrollment into programs offered through the AAA and other providers in the region. Additionally, more than 2,455 "quick calls" were handled through ADRC. Marketing and outreach efforts reached more than 150,000 individuals.
- The Alabama Cares Program assisted more than 1,400 caregivers throughout the region
- The Medicaid Waiver Program served 1,105 clients in FY22 with 465 of them receiving services through the self-directed program, Personal Choices. We also transitioned 11 nursing home residents back into the community with the support of Medicaid Waiver services through our Gateway to Community Living program.
- The Nutrition/Senior Activity Program Approximately 270,000 meals were served through the senior activity centers (SACs) or home delivered meals over the past year. The SACs offer more than a nutrituous meal. They provide a social network to participate in various activities such as cards, bingo, exercise, corn hole, quilting, presentations and health screenings just to name a few! We helped support The Town of Boligee open a senior center in their Town Hall as well.
- The State Health Insurance Program (SHIP) has assisted more than 3,900 Medicare beneficiaries with their coverage questions and options. During the FY22 Open Enrollment Period (OEP), around 1,700 clients visited the AAA for unbiased counseling.
- The Senior Community Service Employment Program (SCSEP) has assisted over 50 participants with job training.
- The Long Term Ombudsman program continues to provide consultations to Long Term Care facilities, investigate complaints, mediate cases (supports families and residents by providing unbiased mediation between them and nursing homes), makes routine visits, and provides inservice trainings.
- Our 11 Evidence Based Programs served over 150 clients this past year. We offer Matter of Balance, Stress Busters for Caregivers of those with dementia, Stress Busters for Caregivers of those with a chronic illness and Bingocize.

Community and Economic Development

- Development Department assisted the University Center for Economic Development (UACED) to carry out planning funded by the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) for the I-22 Corridor counties of Fayette, Lamar, Marion, and Winston. Local leaders participated in completing plans at the regional and county level. These included the I-22 Strategic Development plan (regional plan), the Fayette County Strategic Development plan and the Lamar County Strategic Development plan.
- The 2022-2026 West Alabama Economic Development Playbook (Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy - CEDS) was completed and posted on the WARC website.
- **Staff participated** in the Pickens County Leadership program and the City of Aliceville Alabama Communities of Excellence (ACE) program.
- The WARC Community & Economic
 Development Department assisted local
 municipalities in the West Alabama
 region to administer open grants and
 other allocations totaling \$10,023,280.
- The WARC Revolving Loan Fund approved five loans from the C-19 Covid Relief fund totaling \$125,000 to support seven new jobs and retain 13 jobs. The businesses include: Arayasunshine Candle Company, Myca Mack Beauty, Vernon Medical Center, Poppin' Sisters Popcorn & Treats and Wrap It up Catering.

37,540 people and 291 businesses in the region will benefit from community development grant assistance provided by WARC in 2022.



Six new grant awards totaling \$1,722,148 were approved in FY22; and additional requests of \$652,260 are pending announcement.
